The previous 1½ lines mean that the Merle Haggard single *Okie From Moscogee* was released on Capitol 2626 in 1969; that it also appeared in 1972 on the LP *The Best of the Best of Merle Haggard* from Capitol (catalogue number ST 11082); that it was used as truck stop music in the 1978 United Artists/EMI film *Convoy*, directed by Sam Peckinpah; which I recorded off-air from Swedish TV in 1988. All of that is true. I also report that the YouTube URL for this tune is <http://www.youtube.com/watch?v=ITJwnh0zgVs> and that I viewed it on 3 January 2011. That, however, is a lie.
